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MO. M.591/33. PLAG OFFICER-IN-CHARGE, MILFORD HAVEN.

The Commanding Officer, M.M.S. "Mercury" failed to carry out the regulations, and was thereby responsible for the loss of his ship. He is to be tried by Court Martiel.

- 2. It is not considered that the Board of Daquiry investigated the matter with sufficient thoroughness. The following points arise:-
 - (a) Paragraph 5 (a) of Finding the Commending Officer was not asked why these instructions were not adhered to.
 - (b) Forsgraph 6 of Finding the Commanding Officer was not asked why he did not give orders to cut the sweep wire.
 - (c) The ship was affort for nearly 5 hours and arrangements should have been made to save all the C.B.s and important stores.
 - (d) The Senior Officer of the Flotilla, Commander L.C. Windsor, R.M., was not asked by the Board whether the correct drill was carried out, and what in his opinion was the cause of the explosion and damage to the ship. As a corollary to this, he should have been asked whether the Commanding Officer of the "Mercury" carried out his instructions and regulations.
- 3. The Members of the Board of Inquiry are to be informed in the sense of paragraph 2 above.
