

7. This is at present carried by the server boys at each table. These boys always appear to be in a desperate hurry to complete an unsavoury task. In fact, one boy was observed to collect 8 plates of food though there were only 6 boys on his table; he then collected the sweets without returning the spare main meals. The inference is therefore that when the dirty crockery was collected these two untouched meals found their way into the pig bin.
8. Several causes contribute to this consistent haste shown by the boys, both those who are serving and those who are eating:-
 - (a) The server boys being urged to hasten the meals by the hungry recipients at each table.
 - (b) The desire shown by boys to consume the meal (or otherwise dispose of it) as quickly as possible in order that they should enjoy the maximum amount of leisure time during the rest of their break. This is particularly evident at lunch time.
 - (c) The fact that boys are continually under the eye of their Instructors during the meal time gives an added incentive to get away from the dining hall as soon as possible.
9. One result of this consistent hurrying is that crockery is frequently broken or cracked during a meal time. Though cracked plates and cups do not fall into the category of breakages, the presence of these cracks increases the likelihood of a breakage during washing up or other operations.
