Subject:— Fleet Chief Petty Officers.

Referred to:—

(Officers are requested to make their remarks in the form of a suggested letter or memo)

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Int'l. Liaison

I understand that reports are being called for to collate the various comments and observations regarding Fleet Chief Petty Officers. It was my intention to produce my observations after a period of 6 months following promotion. However, since the discussion is taking place now, the following comments may be of interest:

1. Title of Office

After some initial hiccups, the use of 'Sir' and 'Mister' in the correct manner is improving. It is understood that it will take some time ~~will~~ to get it right, but there is still room for improvement from all Officers and ratings. The difficulties arose because:-

- (i) Junior Ratings were generally not aware of the new rank and the terms of reference.
- (ii) Most of the Fleet Petty Officers were in most cases retained in the same capacity/establishment and the majority were employed in the same job. They were simply 'promoted' as Aids and Ministers on one day and back in the field the next day.
- (iii) Officers and ratings have become used to the term 'Chief' that it naturally takes time to become familiar with the new terms of reference.

2. Uniform

Various comments have already been made and I understand that FCPO Barrard is aware of most of them. My own view is that we still look like Chief Petty Officers. Whilst it is appreciated that there is to be no return to the old style Warrant Officer uniform we must surely prepare ourselves for the term 'Warrant Officer' to replace that of 'Fleet Chief Petty Officer'. In order to accommodate this I should like to see:-

- (i) a flat collar jacket.
- (ii) Cuff buttons taken off.
- (iii) The Royal Coat of Arms worn on both sleeves in the same position.

3. Title

The sooner we replace the term Fleet Chief Petty Officer with 'Warrant Officer' the better. I am distressed at finding numerous official documents lumping together the titles 'Fleet Chief Petty Officers/Chief Petty Officers/Petty Officers'. I have seen the gradual erosion of the status and privileges of Chief Petty Officers over that of the Petty Officers, partly because of the continual use of the term Chief Petty Officers and Petty Officers.

4. Privileges

Whilst appreciating the difficulties in extending privileges to Fleet Chief Petty Officers without adversely affecting those of Chief Petty Officers, there must be some serious thought given towards

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What at present I make their entries in the form of a marginal letter -

extending privilages to Fleet Chief Petty Officers in order to widen the gap between them and Chief Petty Officers. Suggested improvements in this area are contained in Annex Alpha.

3. Job Definition

The introduction of the new rank brought its own problems as to the tasks and extra responsibilities that would be undertaken. It is clearly undesirable to build a job around the Fleet Chief Petty Officer but he has to fit in somewhere. His status is enhanced and can be measured by the amount of extra responsibility he carries. Furthermore this improved status brings its own reward in terms of 'job satisfaction'.

The reason however stems from the fact the Fleet Chief Petty Officer is neither a Commissioned Officer nor a Chief Petty Officer, and yet, by the very nature of his job he carries the functions of both.

This favourable situation should be remedied once the functions and term of reference are clearly defined. I am in no doubt that in due course the Fleet Chief Petty Officer will fulfil a worthwhile role as the senior member of the middle management class and will become an established member of society in exactly the same way as his counterpart, the ~~in~~ in the Army and the Warrant Officer in the R.A.F.

• Final officer appointments

There are many minor problems to be clarified - one a Fleet Chief Petty Officer is filling a complement billet in my appointment previously held by an Officer. The irony of it all is that I am Divisional Officer for such 10 Ratings and in my turn, sign various documents - for travelling allowances claims to request for separation amounts as yet technically my own expense claims - can be signed by an Officer.

By intent I caused my voting form to be based on the electoral situation - without having it signed by a "attesting Officer". It was assumed as being immediately filled in.

Some of the major problems are:

(1) Signatures. For confidential publications an 'Official' loan from the C.S. Office. Under the present rules, only an 'Officer' can do this.

(ii) participation in an audit as part of G.P.C. examination.

adequate housing and accommodation for crews. Chief Petty Officers is desirable but not mandatory. No doubt the cost would be prohibitive to running it in existing buildings in store areas, dormitories and in ships. However, there no reason why this cannot be done in as a requirement for new construction ships and reconstruction of older ships. They could possibly have their own bar room/casino room in shore side buildings, where they can discuss the affairs of the union with their guests. Consideration should also be given to the giving them their own bar facilities.

It is noted that Darling Division has made up a Fleet Chief Petty Officers carrying his sword. This is an unusual custom that is retained in order to show his unique position of Military Command.

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However, now that we are in an era of First Chief Petty Officers and will soon be in an era of Warrant Officers, I consider that the status of this new rank would be considerably enhanced if we were allowed to have the MA style sword, particularly as we are being employed on Divisions as Officers in charge of stations.

1. FCPO's should not appear on general muster lists (Sickbay etc., etc. etc.). All such requirements should be dealt with directly between the anchor and the FCPO's Head President.
2. FCPO's should be given every opportunity of having separate lines for general administrative requirements (say Office queries, Clothing Store etc.)
3. General documentation (Leave requests, Travelling Expenses etc.) should be modified for FCPO's in order to reduce the requirement for an Officers counter signature.
4. FCPO's in Divisions and not being employed as Officers ~~in charge~~ of Platoons, should be full in separately next to the un-attached Officers.
5. FCPO leave documentation (Leave requests, Car mileage claims, Leave passes etc.) should be overhauled drastically. Suggest that FCPO's should be allowed to deal direct with the Regulating Staff in order to have leave dates recorded on the Leave Entitlement Record card. This would also apply on return from leave, thus doing away with the Leave Request form and the return of the leave pass.

6. Uniform.

In addition to paragraph 2 of the general comments, the following improvements are suggested.

The insignia of the Fleet Chief Petty Officer when dressed in Action working rig (No. 8's) or in 2B's or 2B's is not distinctive enough.

DCI 459/71 stated that the small metal Royal coat of Arms (vocab No. 35017) would be worn "in the same manner and with the same dress as for CPO's and PO's" i.e. on the tie in 2N and 2B dress and on the collar of No.8 and No. 10 dress. Because of the small size of this particular badge (similar in size to the CPO and PO collar/tie badge) it is impossible to identify a Fleet Chief Petty Officer at 20 paces and in particular when not wearing a cap.

The proposal is that the Royal Arms be worn on the shoulder with dress No.2B, 2N, 8's and No.10's :-

- (i) Using the metal badges on the shoulder of 2B, 2N and No. 10's.
- (ii) Using the blue printed shoulder badges (vocab. No. 25826) with No.8's.

These proposals will clearly require that Fleet Chief Petty Officers must have the Officers type white and No.8 style shirts in order to make use of the shoulder straps.

The immediate advantages of using shoulder markings is that the FCPO/Marrant Officer is instantly recognised at distances or when in Offices in 2B or 2B dress without head-gear, because :-

- (i) Officers are still easily identified by their gold woven shoulder straps.
- (ii) Chief Petty Officers and Petty Officers are easily identified by their metal badges on their tie or collars.

Therefore,

- (iii) Fleet Chief Petty Officers/Marrant Officers will be ^{more} easily identified as the only ones who wear shoulder devices other than the Officers gold woven rings.

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
